Why Debs was removed suddenly and in such great secrecy from the comparatively comfortable quarters at Moundsville to the more stringent conditions of the Atlanta prison have been a subject of much speculation among Socialists and the million admirers of Comrade Debs. Nor is any enlightenment thrown upon the matter by any one in authority, nor is Debs himself aware of the reason for his transference. Other than a statement by an official of the federal prisons at Washington, that Debs had een removed at the request of authorities at Moundsville, nothing is known concerning the reason for his

AT WORK IN CLOTHING DE-PARTMENT.

Comrade Debs has now been as- strike. He was found guilty of consigned to clerical work in the clothing department of the Atlanta prison. The clothing department is one of the big departments of the prison, stituted the basis of the conviction. where nearly three thousand prisoners are confined. The clothing of all prisoners is cared for inside the prison. Not only are the thousands of grey suits worn by the prisoners made in the prison, but the repairing and laundering is also done inside the walls. This work requires the labor of many prisoners. Keeping accounts of suits made, repaired, discarded, etc., are demands made upon those prisoners capable, through their educational advantages of do-ing such work. It is work of this nature that Eugene V Debs four, times the candidate of the Socialist party for president of the United States, is doing at this moment.

That Debs will fare as well as can be expected is believed by those somewhat conversant with conditions in the prison. Debs' immediate su-perior is a Mr. Boyle, who is credited with being a "fairly good fellow," by inmates of the prison. Associated with Debs in this department are former bank clerks who have erred and other accountants and clerical workers.

1RON RULES NOT MODIFIED. The cell which Debs occupies is about 10 by 5 by 10 feet high. Two prisoners occupy each cell. At Moundsville, Debs was given a generous sized room instead of a cell. THAN NEW YORK

Dayton, Ohio, June 18, 1919.

Hon. A. Mitchell Palmer, Attorney General of the United

Sir: As one of the counsel for Eugene V. Debs in his trial tinue to fulminate against Soviet at Cleveland, Ohio, which resulted in his conviction of violating the Espionage Act and his sentence to a term of imprisonment at the Moundsville penitentiary, West Virginia, I write to you concerning recent news items in the daily press that Mr. Debs has been transferred from Moundsville to Atlanta.

> The law, I take it, governing this transfer is found in U. S. R. S. Sec. 5546, as amended by act of July 12, 1876, 19 Stat. at L. 88. It reads as follows:

"And the place of imprisonment may be changed in any case, when, in the opinion of the attorney general, it is necessary for the preservation of the health of the prisoner or when in his opinion the place of confinement is not sufficient to secure the custody of the prisoner, or because of cruel or improper treatment; provided, however, that no change shall be made in the case of any prisoner on the ground of unhealthiness of the prisoner, or because of his treatment, after his conviction and during his term of imprisonment, unless such change shall be applied for by such prisoner, or some one in his behalf."


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



The power of the press to for public opinion is greater than any other in all he world. Armies are overpowered by it, naves are helpless before it. It is the real ruler of the world.

The power of th press for promulgating a lie is great but its pwer for spreading truth is a thousand times grater. Truth in itself is a power. It is invitible in the end. No lie can stand against it fo long. The truth given even an unequal chance with lies will win the race.

The business of very Socialist is to spread the truth about the mtives and the purposes of the organized workers. To do it as effectively as pos-

sible should be a chief consideration. For the more effectively it is done, the quicker will we increase the power of the workers for a workers' democracy.

The most effective manner in which this can be done is to place the workers in control of the means of publicity. With this added power, the power of the workers to carry the truth to their fellows is doubled, trebled, yes, increased an hundred fold. The time has come for the workers to strike back at the lies of capitalist hirelings. And the way to strike back is to tell the truth and to make possible the telling of it to greater and greater numbers.

Manifesto Published by the British sentation on the Reparation Commis-Labor Party.

The national executive committee of the British Labor party considers that the published summary of the peace treaty in some essential particulars is opposed to the declarations of President Wilson, the inter-Allied conferences and the Berne conference; is very defective from the standpoint of world peace, and bears evidence of compromise influenced by capitalist imperialism which still dominates the European states.

In so far as organized labor was not represented in the peace congress which drafted the treaty, and as its general spirit does not conform to the working-class conception of a peace of justice and right, we can accept no responsibility for the violations of principle involved in the settlement.
