RUSH TRIAL OF ATLANTA SIX

ATLANTA, Ga.—Every effort is being made by Assistant Solicitor General Hudson to rush the trial of the six organizers charged with insurrection. Hudson wants to rush the trial of the six organizers charged with insurrection.

Hudson who said he would demand the death penalty for any Communist caught speaking or spreading literature in Fulton County, will attempt to divide up the group of six and try them separately. CHATTANOOGA JOBLESS PRESENT DEMAND TO CITY; UNEMPLOYMENT CONFERENCE CALLED FOR OCT. 19

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn.—In a letter addressed to Mayor Ross, the Unemployed Council of Chattanooga called to the attention of the city council the growing unemployment and starvation of the 15,000 unemployed men and women in the city and asked for the demand of the unemployed workers. A committee of unemployed workers will present their demands to the City Council this week.

At the same time, the unemployed workers are demanding that the city council call a conference for October 19 to discuss the unemployment problem. The conference will be held in the city hall and will be attended by the city council, the unemployed workers, and the representatives of the A. F. of L. and the Communist Party.

COMMUNISTS WIN IN GERMAN POLL

BERLIN, Germany.—The biggest vote polled by any party in Berlin was obtained by the Communist party of Germany in the Reichstag (German) elections and a total of 74 seats were won by Communist candidates throughout the country. This gives the Communist party the largest representation in the Reichstag.

The fascists, who represented the bourgeoisie and the middle class and are for an open book dictatorship with 107 seats, while the social democrats who represent the same bourgeoisie element within the existing laws in the A. F. of L. and socialists in the United States, had 143 seats, a loss of 10.

The overwhelming vote given the Communist Party in the industrial centers of the country show that the German working class is rallying to the revolutionary program, fighting to rid itself of the Young Plan, of exploitation and the social democratic betrayal in virtually giving up the social insurance laws and calling out strikes. The vote shows that the working class is fully alert to the danger of a fascist dictatorship and a new war and will fight against them. It is highly probable that the social-democratic will again openly ally themselves with the bourgeoisie parties to form the new government.

U.T.W.U. Confirms JAIL SPEAKER No-Strike, Sell- Out Policies AT RED MEET

NEW YORK.—I have greeted with the warmest of welcomes the U. T. W. U. Conference of the United Textile Workers at the convention of the A. F. of L. which had been called in New York, Va. which was held at the Hotel Waldorf Astoria on the 14th and 15th of September. I was glad to see the labor leader who is doing his best to keep the labor movement from going to the dogs.

Gorman has declared that he is greatly interested in the work of the U. T. W. U. and that he was glad to see a strike which he termed a "labor strike" in which the workers are fighting for their own interests and not for the interests of the employers.

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CHATTANOOGA, Tenn.—The Communist Party continues its election campaign here in the face of the increased efforts of the bosses and their agents to intimidate workers.

The tactics of the bosses are to intimidate and follow the more law-abiding workers with such little success as the police of Chattanooga. The police have charged Gorman with loitering and vagrancy and he has been held in jail for several days.

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A Vagrancy Warrant - Ross Answer To The Unemployed

How viciously the legal apparatus of the bosses works against workers, especially unemployed Negro workers, is shown by the case of one worker who was arrested in Trenton, Clatsop county, Florida and served 3 months in jail without knowing the charge that he was convicted of.

At first the judge tried to send this worker to the chain gang on a vagrancy charge, but the thousands of unemployed workers are suffering in the South now. The worker, however, proved that he was employed and because he was able to stand up for himself so well, the judge thought he would teach "this nigger" a lesson and ordered him put back in jail. After spending 3 months in the County jail he was tried by a jury of six white men, altho the law says that a jury must be composed of 12 men, and before the worker could say a word he found himself sentenced to 6 months in jail.

The original warrant on vagrancy sworn out against him is a typical example of how the law is used by the bosses to find slave labor for their chain gangs. The names referred to in this historic document are all fictitious characters and were inserted by the judge to make the case look serious.

Here it is:

"Carl A. Moore, alias Harry, Baby A. Moore, Fork Chops alias Harry Jones, Howards alias Howard Jones, Slim alias Freddie Jones and John De alias Eddie, were vagans and vagabonds, idle or dissolute persons, common gamblers, persons who use unlawful games or plays, column papers and fiddlers, common drunkards, common night walkers, thieves, pilferers, loafers and lascivious persons, common ratters and betwys, persons who neglect their calling or employment, or are without reasonable continuous employment or regular income and who have not sufficient property to support them, persons wandering or strolling around from place to place without any lawful purpose or object, habitual loafers, idle and disorderly persons, persons neglecting all lawful business, and habitually spending their time by frequenting houses of ill fame, gaming houses or tippling shops."

These legal sounding court words are intended for workers whose only crime is that they cannot find a job! It is hard to find a more insulting document against labor and against Negroes.

and demanded by the U. T. W. U. that a minimum of \$25 a week be paid every unemployed worker who is unable to work because of the lack of employment. The U. T. W. U. has been successful in getting the Federal government to pay unemployment benefits to a large number of workers.

Shows Jobless Suffering

The U. T. W. U. has pointed out that very few industries are actually running full time, or with a full force. Crane Rental, usually employing 3,000 men and more, now employs 150. The Southern R. R. Shop cars, its force from about 700 to 800, has been reduced to 200. The U. T. W. U. has organized a mass "baiting" and "baiting" place in all factories. Side by side with the those workers who are employed are only working two and three days a week, are receiving the wages but after another and are driven to a death pace, resulting in larger layoffs.

The resulting proposal of the Salvation Army for "five" meals at 15 cents, or meals of \$2 for a limited number of married men, were secured as "visions of the seriousness of unemployment and also a manner of confusing the workers." The Associated Charities, the Community Fund and the Red Cross are shown to be bogus charity organizations whose chief purpose is to prevent workers from organizing. It is pointed out that the city government is throwing unemployed workers by the score to jail and on the chain gang on charges of vagrancy, and that police and robots, starved because are spreading among the workers of the city.

CHILDREN DYING FROM DROUGHT

Despite all attempts to buck things up reports have come to Washington of the serious effects of the drought on the health of children.

In Maryland the health department finds the children's death rate for July higher than for any month since the influenza epidemic of January, 1918. The drought, the heat, the fact that the government is interested in money profits and not workers' children, has led to a steady growth of suffering and death of children.

Reports from Oklahoma point out the increase of disease and death due to the drought and heat. The secretary of the Board of Children's Guardians in West Virginia declares that the drought has had harmful effects on the children of that state.

A DAY IN HOT KILNS FOR \$2.00

I stayed at the Lookout Pipe Shops for 13 years. When I first worked there I was paid \$1.50 a day. During the World War I was paid \$3.00 a day for about one year, then was cut to \$2.75 a day for about one month and then cut to \$2.50 a day.

It wasn't long before the boss could see how there a sign "Come Out of Business, Bankrupt, Sale" and one large sign "It has happened, goods below cost." You could hear the workers laughing and saying, "Yes, we know it has happened."

The dirtiest and stinkiest manufacturing plant that I know of is a fertilizer plant. We have a factory of this kind near the Houston turned basin and the bosses cut the wages down from 70 cents to 50 cents an hour with the promise that the men who remained on the job would get their regular wages again as soon as conditions would get better.

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Fight Lynching

Lynch law sharpens its ferocity as unemployment grows worse and as the farm crisis deepens. Last week one Negro was lynched in the Darien, Ga., jail, another was murdered by the posse of guardsmen and officers near Darien, two Negroes were lynched in Mississippi, an attempted lynching took place in Eastman, Ga., and there are mobs on the man hunt for more victims at Darien and at Russellville, Ark. In addition to lynchings, persecutions and shooting of Negroes by officers grows sharper every day.

Lynch law is being set to work at a quick pace in the North, also. In Chicago, Lee Mason, Negro candidate for Congress on the Communist ticket, died as the result of a brutal beating by Chicago police when he spoke at a meeting to protest the lynchings at Marion, Indiana. Romaine Ferguson, militant Negro woman, was arrested for protesting lynchings at the same meeting. The most militant workers are being chosen as victims of the boss lynch mobs, and lynch courts.

The intensive lynch wave against Negro workers is part of the nationwide campaign of terror being waged against the workers who are growing ever more militant in their refusal to accept starvation as their lot. During the course of this year five militant white workers were murdered by police in New York and Chicago for their participation in the workers' struggle for better conditions. The bosses' courts are busily at work handing out long prison sentences to militant workers. Thousands of unemployed workers are slaving on the Southern chain gangs for the crime of being unemployed. The bosses of Atlanta are rushing the trial of six organizers whom they intend to burn on the electric chair by legal lynching.

There must be absolutely no hesitation on the part of the workers to respond to the national anti-lynching campaign now being led by the American Negro Labor Congress, the Communist Party and the revolutionary unions of the T. U. U. L. At the very center of the lynch-law domain, the workers of the South must hold their anti-lynching conference and send delegates to the St. Louis Convention of the A. N. L. C. to be held on November 15. No worker, white or black, can call himself a militant member of his class, unless he does everything in his power to broaden and organize the fight against lynching by bringing the question of the Southern Anti-Lynching Conference before his Union or his organization, by spreading the slogan of organizing defense groups of white and Negro workers to defeat lynch mobs.

Pleading for The Bosses

Southern workers could have had no more bitter experience with labor fakery than they have had since the A. F. of L. began its southern campaign. Years of experience in sell-out and betrayal were brought by the A. F. of L. organizers to the South to add to their black record already attained here.

These agents of the bosses have just held their textile union convention in New York City. The textile workers who have seen how the A. F. of L. permitted wage-cuts and victimization at Leaksville-Drapers-Spry, at Danville, Virginia, in Greensboro, N. C., by doing their best to keep the workers from striking; the thousands of unemployed workers who are left entirely out of the picture by the fakery—these workers are fast beginning to realize the treachery of this outfit. At the convention Francis J. German, vice-president of the United Textile Workers declared that the newspapers of Danville, Va., did him great injustice by saying that he was attempting to call a strike. "I have pleaded with the workers not to strike for several months," the rat said.

Furniture workers at High Point, N. C. also heard strange words from still stronger labor leaders when they were demanding a strike against the Bedau system of stretch-out which has just been introduced into the plant. Chas. Gaskill, A. F. of L. representative, told them that if they intended to strike the A. F. of L. would not move a finger to help them, and instead told them to go back to work.

The efforts of the A. F. of L. to muzzle the workers and make them accept the wage-cuts, speed-up and unemployment will not succeed. Strikes are on the order of the day. The National Textile Workers Union of the T. U. U. L. with its promise of organize and strike against wage-cuts and speed-up is fast winning ground among the textile workers. Militant textile workers are learning where to find their proper leadership.

Organize and Strike Now

In the work of the Trade Union Unity League, the national center of revolutionary unionism, and in the work of the industrial unions affiliated to the T. U. U. L. in the South too much emphasis has been placed on purely educational activity and too little on actual organization and preparation for struggle.

The workers are ready to fight. The Bessemer City strike, the numerous successful outbreaks of a few hours in dozens of shops in protest against speed-up and speed-up, the wide acceptance of the T. U. U. L. program of organize and strike, the willingness of the workers all show this clearly. It is the job of the revolutionary unions to organize and strike now. Marion Official In Lynching

CHICAGO, Ill. — Startling revelations on the lynching of Toh Shipp and Abe Smith in Marion, Indiana, in August are contained in the report of a special committee which has just returned from Marion, Indiana, where it was sent by the Chicago International Labor Defense to investigate the lynchings.

The report establishes beyond question the active role of state and city officers for these brutal crimes. It reveals that:

1. Before the lynchings several Negroes secured the promises of the Chief of Police, Smith, and Sheriff Campbell to protect the Negro prisoners from lynching, but when the mob began to assemble without interference they attempted to get in touch with the governor at Indianapolis. The Governor's Secretary hung up the receiver, refusing to talk to them.

2. Sheriff Jacob Campbell (celebrated with Klans support) after arresting the three Negroes, Smith, Shipp and Cameron, hung the bloody shirt of another Negro (shot in a quarrel between himself and Smith) in one of the jail windows facing the Courthouse Square; he then circulated the false report that Mary Ball, a white girl, had been raped by a Negro.

3. The substance of the Sheriff's false statements quickly spread, and a mob began assembling before the courthouse, starting at the bloody shirt.

4. Chief of Police Smith, observing the lynching maneuvers, ordered the Negro policemen on duty to go home.

5. Sheriff Campbell arranged that the doors of the jail of the cells of Shipp and Smith be unlocked.

6. When the organized mob were ready to get Smith, Shipp and Cameron, Sheriff Campbell was on hand, and backed in front of the mob to the unlocked cells of Smith and Shipp in this manner leading the mob to the cells.

7. Several other Negroes, confined in the jail, were also threatened with lynching. Among them, W. Bearague, who was badly beaten, is now missing.
